At the March Cashion Board of Education meeting, the board members officially allocated money from the 2007 bond for technology. In particular, we are purchasing ten more interactive white boards (IWB) for the district. Earlier in the fall, we purchased ten boards from Smart for classroom teachers and three for the special education teachers. These teachers have undergone training and will act as trainers for the recipients of the next 10 IWBs. We have also contracted with our vendor to provide further training to all teachers. Technology will also be state of the art in our new computer lab with a Smart Board, document camera, Smart slate, interactive response system and other peripherals.

IWBs have been most prominent in education in Great Britain. English schools began using the boards in the late 1990's with the majority of the boards purchased from Smart Technologies. Early in the 21st century, the British government channeled millions of dollars into schools solely for the purchase and implementation of the IWBs. It is from their experiences that schools in the United States will learn what the best teaching practices are for this technology. There are some promising research results from the regular use of the IWB in the elementary grades. For instance, 7.5 months of additional progress has been measured for boys struggling in science. Girls of average mathematical attainment made 2.5 months of additional progress. The boards are evolving in their uses and it should prove to be an exciting time in many classrooms in Cashion schools.

When students discover their own self-worth and approach life prepared to achieve, the opportunities are endless. This is the philosophy behind the Teen Leadership course (available in middle and high school versions). The course teaches students to take responsibility, express themselves, and handle problems and decisions when they arise. Here are some of those outcomes:

- Develop a healthy self-concept, healthy relationships, and a sense of personal responsibility
- Understand Emotional Intelligence and the skills it measures, including self-awareness, self-control, self-motivation, and social skills
- Build skills in public speaking and communication as well as an understanding of personal image
- Develop an understanding of principle-based decision-making and learn to make responsible personal and financial decisions
- Recognize and resist peer pressure
- Learn to become better family members and citizens
- Appreciate the need for vision in goal-setting, personally and professionally

We will also be hosting our Prom on April 3rd at the Guthrie Depot. We all want our students to have a fun and enjoyable experience but, with that being said, we all want them to make safe choices. As this

time is exciting for our students, parents and our patrons I was able to find an article that I believe is informative and helpful in dealing with the issues of prom night. This article was taken in its entirety from this website <http://www.education.com/grade/emotional/high-school/page2/> and it was written by Hannah Boyd titled Keeping Prom Night Safe. In the glow of graduation, college acceptance, and teen romance, even the most sensible kids take risks they shouldn't on prom night. Binge drinking, drunk driving, and sex can even seem like rites of passage. Here's what you need to know to keep your teenager safe:

- Make sure your child and, ideally, you, know her date. If it's a fix-up, ask her to meet the guy beforehand in a public space to confirm that he seems okay. Remind her that it's best not to be alone with anyone she doesn't know well.
- For many teenagers, the prom itself is just one stop in a night that begins with dinner and may end the next day after brunch. Make sure you know your child's agenda and approve of every stop. If he's at loose ends and you're brave enough, offer to host breakfast at your place; you'll know where your child is and be able to monitor everyone's condition.
- While you're sure to earn some eye-rolling, it's worth asking your teenager to rehearse how he'd react if offered alcohol or drugs.
- While you're at it, reiterate that sex isn't something to be undertaken impulsively, lightly, or without safeguards. Prom lasts one night; pregnancy and STDs don't.
- The biggest danger teens face on prom night is auto accidents, either because the driver has been drinking or is simply distracted by a carload of exuberant pals. If you can afford it, chip in for a chauffeured limousine ride; you'll know there are seatbelts for every passenger, and you'll know the driver is experienced and sober.
- According to the National Highway Travel Safety Administration, car crashes were the leading cause of death for people between ages 15-20 in 2005 (the last year for which data was available), and 23% of drivers killed had blood alcohol content over .08. When someone drinks

and drives, they are not only more likely to get into an accident; the accident is more likely to be severe, and the passenger is less likely to wear a seatbelt. If you can't afford a limo, tell your child you will be available at all hours to take his phone call and pick him and his friends up – no questions asked.

- Don't let your child out the door without a cell phone (yours if she doesn't have one) and money for a cab – just in case.

If your children complain that you're taking all the fun out of a night that comes once in a lifetime, remind them that it's your job to make sure that lifetime is as long as possible. The fun is their responsibility.
