Happy Holidays! The calendar pages are turning rather quickly making it hard to believe we are getting ready to wrap up our first semester. In regards to testing, we have posted the semester test schedule online and put it on the official school calendar. Please make every effort to have your student here for these important exams.

It really has been an exciting time at Cashion High School where our focus is to provide your student with a challenging environment and the right tools to help them reach their goals as an individual, whether that is college, job after high school or a technical school. Our staff will do what is necessary to provide students with interventions to attain their goals.

We have had some pretty neat things going on throughout the school. This past month we had Chad Cargill come to our school and provide a four-hour class on how to improve ACT scores. If your student wasn't able to sign up for the class, I would suggest that you look up Mr. Cargill's schedule online and find a time to get him/her into this workshop. Students who attended really thought it was well worth their time. I was able to stay for the first session and was really impressed with the amount of information given and how he was able to apply it to our students.

Right before the break we had Carla Jenkins come to our school and provide training for our junior high students on cyber-bullying and bullying in general. She gave some great information that I believe will make our school safer for students to learn. I would also ask that if your children are expressing to you that they are being harassed, urge them to report the behavior to a teacher, counselor or principal. In the main office, we have forms for students to fill out and outline exactly what is going on. It is our desire at Cashion that our school is a safe place for all students. If they don't feel comfortable coming to the office then they also have the options of talking with their parents, or even calling the safe schools hotline (1-877-723-3225, Extension 651) which is an anonymous hotline through the State Department. This hotline can be used when you have knowledge of drugs, weapons or violent acts in our schools or other schools. The call is completely anonymous. We simply receive a fax in our office and are required to take action on the information we are given. Remember: if we don't know about the behaviors, it is hard to correct the problem. Parents please help us make our campus a safe place where we can educate all students. We need to be proactive as parents, educators and students to eliminate any kind of bullying behavior.

As we transition from football season to basketball season, I would like to remind students, parents and patrons that last summer we adopted a Sportsmanship Pledge. If you are a supporter of our programs, please read this pledge and make sure you are compliant with this policy. Our students are held accountable for proper behavior at games and extra-curricular events. As role models for these students we need to model those same behaviors at games. I also ask that you let the coaches coach and please don't be derogatory to the officials. We need to treat everyone with respect and let our coaches debate with the officials. Let's cheer our students on to victory and support our student-athletes. I have included a copy of our Spectators' Code of Conduct.

# **Spectator Code of Conduct Athletics Program**

The following code of conduct for spectators should serve as a model for sports fans at all school-sponsored athletic events:

**BELIEVING THAT** sportsmanship is a by-product of a spirit of tolerance and good will and the centering of attention on the good qualities involved, and

**BELIEVING THAT** my conduct is an important part of the school's athletic program,

I PLEDGE to act in accordance with these principles.

As an athletic spectator, I will:

- 1. Exemplify the highest moral character, behavior, and leadership so as to be a worthy example.
- 2. Maintain and exhibit poise and self-discipline during and after the contest.
- 3. Conduct myself in such a manner that attention is not drawn to me, but to the participants playing the game.
- 4. Regulate my actions at all times so that I will be a credit to the team I support, knowing the school gets the praise or blame for my conduct because I represent the school, as well as the athletes.
- 5. Support all reasonable moves to improve good sportsmanship.
- 6. Treat a visiting team and spectators as guests, being courteous and fair.
- 7. Avoid actions that will offend the individual athlete.
- 8. Accept the judgment of the coach.
- 9. Honor the rights of the visitors in a manner in which I would like to be treated.
- 10. Respect the property of the school.
- 11. Display good sportsmanship by being modest in victory and gracious in defeat.
- 12. Pay respect to both teams as they enter for competition.
- 13. Appreciate the good plays by both teams.
- 14. Show sympathy for an injured player.
- 15. Regard the officials as guests and treat them as such.
- 16. Direct my energy to encouraging my team rather that booing the officials.
- 17. Believe that officials are fair and accept their decisions as final.
- 18. Learn the rules of the game in order to be a more intelligent fan.
- 19. Consider it a privilege and a duty to encourage everyone to live up to the

- 20. Realize that privileges are invariably associated with great responsibilities
  - and that spectators have great responsibility.

# FREE COLLEGE TUITION Oklahoma's Promise

## (Formerly OHLAP) ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible to enroll in Oklahoma's Promise, a student must meet the following requirements:

- The student must be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.
- The student must be enrolled in the 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, or 10<sup>th</sup> grade. [Home school students must be age 13, 14, or 15.]
- Student must be enrolled by June 30<sup>th</sup> of the 10<sup>th</sup> grade.
- The income of the student's parent(s) from taxed and untaxed sources for the most recently completed federal tax year must not exceed \$50,000.
- Meet additional qualifications as stated in the Oklahoma Promise application.
- Visit www.okpromise.org to see additional requirements and apply.

#### **CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT**

High school seniors who meet the eligibility requirements are entitled to receive tuition waivers for up to six hours per semester beginning the summer after their junior year and continuing until high school graduation. **To qualify for enrollment students must have the following:** 

<u>Seniors:</u> Oklahoma State University - Score a 24 ACT or 1090 SAT **OR** have a 3.0 GPA AND rank in the top 33 percent of your class. University of Oklahoma - Score a 24 ACT or 1090 SAT AND have a 3.0 GPA or rank in the top 50 percent of your class **OR** have a 3.0 GPA AND rank in the top 30 percent of your class. All Other Regional Universities - Score a 20 ACT or 940 SAT **OR** have a 3.0 GPA AND rank in the top 50 percent of your class. Community Colleges - Score a 19 ACT or 900 SAT **OR** have a 3.0 GPA.

Juniors also qualify for concurrent enrollment but do not qualify for tuition waivers from the State of Oklahoma:

<u>Juniors:</u> Research Universities (OSU and OU) - Score a 25 ACT or 1130 SAT OR have a 3.5 GPA. All Other Regional Universities - Score a 23 ACT or 1050 SAT OR have a 3.5 GPA. Community Colleges - Score a 21 ACT or 980 SAT OR have a 3.5 GPA.

## who may apply

Applicants must be:

- Oklahoma residents8th-, 9th- or 10th-grade
- students (homeschool students must apply while age 13, 14 or 15)
- Students whose parents earn \$50,000 or less per year\*
- Students who promise to meet the requirements of the program
- \* Special income provisions apply to certain adopted children and children in the custody of legal guardians.

## the promise

Upon completion of the program's requirements, you will earn:

- Free tuition at an Oklahoma public twoyear college or fouryear university
- OR a portion of tuition at an accredited Oklahoma private college or university
- OR a portion of tuition for courses at public technology centers that are approved for credit toward an Associate of Applied Science degree at a public college.

The scholarship amount does not cover fees, books, supplies or room and board.
