The state of Oklahoma has been very progressive in the systematic adoption of minimum standards of education for its students. I know that during almost my entire teaching career PASS (Priority Academic Student Skills) was the basis for instruction in all core classes. the arts, and physical education. In 2010, Oklahoma joined with over 40 other states to move to Common Core State Standards (CCSS) by 2014. The standards were created by teachers, parents, education experts, and others from across the country. The Standards provide clear, consistent expectations for what students should be learning at each grade in order to be prepared for college and career choices. These standards ensure that students, no matter where they live and attend school, will be focused on a postsecondary education and careers after high school graduation. The CCSS were designed to support our mobile society not only in the USA but globally.

Cashion Schools has already begun the transition to Common Core State Standards under the guidance of the Oklahoma State Department of Education. Students will be assessed according to these new standards in 2014 - 2015. While it may seem early, we hope to give our students every opportunity to adjust to the new expectations and find success in the classroom. Your administrative team has undergone some training with more to follow. In addition, teachers have already received information and some training to better serve the educational needs of your children. This will continue throughout the coming years with opportunities for teacher professional development within the district and at other sites.

We have added new faces to the high school faculty which now will include Pam Beck who will teach English; Angie Cowan who is our new counselor; Dennis Diviney who will teach Special Education and coach; James Todd who is a Science teacher and a coach; Brilla Todd who will teach English and Science; and Steve Tiller who will teach Math and coach. Please welcome these new teachers to our Cashion family. I am extremely excited about what they have to offer to our students and to our community.

We are in the process of changing over to our new website. This website will be a great tool that will help you stay informed on upcoming school events and class projects. I am eager for the transition because it will help with our communication home. I would also like to suggest to all parents that you come to the office to get your parent passwords and usernames to see what your child is doing in the classroom. With this information you can look at class grades, attendance and school lunch room balance information. This is an excellent way to be proactive and help your student stay on track.

Parents please help us with our policies and procedures regarding attendance and cell phones. Attendance is important. We are required by state law to keep an accurate record of attendance of all students. If a student must be absent from school, the parents should call the day before if possible, or the morning of the day the student is absent. If the parent does not have a telephone or fails to call the school, he must send a note back to school with the student stating the date of absence and the reason for the absence. of Regular attendance is tremendous value to the student as well as to the school. Irregular attendance, regardless of the cause, will not produce satisfactory results. attendance Regular stimulates interest in work and prevents your student from being discouraged because of being behind in class. A student who has developed the selfdiscipline necessary to be present in school and on time will have the advantage both in school and on the job in future years. A pupil out of school one day really loses two days of work because he comes to school unprepared for the day following the absence.

When a student is absent, instruction, discussion, interactions and other intangibles are lost forever. Habits of regularity and punctuality are good habits to form. In addition, in many cases, business firms have refused to employ those whose school attendance has been poor.

We would appreciate your help as we embrace technology

in the classroom without hurting the educational environment. The following is the policy on cell phones: While realizing that cellular and other like devices provide excellent means of communication and connection between students and parents outside of school hours, their use during school is in conflict with our stated mission of focused educational opportunity during the school day.

Parents needing to contact students during the day should leave messages with the office. Please do not disrupt your student's academic day by calling or texting your child.

Cell phones are not to be used or even turned on during classroom or passing time. <u>Students may only</u> <u>use their phones before the first</u> <u>bell rings, after the last bell rings,</u> <u>and during lunchtime.</u> During all other times, phones must be turned OFF. They may not be turned on and may not be turned to silent. They must be OFF.

Students whose phones are found to be on (to include ringing, vibrating, "checking the time", etc) or who attempt to otherwise use them during school hours will have the device confiscated and brought to the office. The consequences will likely be as follows:

 \circ 1st offense – warning and parent contact

• 2nd offense – detention and parent may be required to pick up phone

 \circ **3**rd **offense** – ISD and parent will be required to pick up phoneSubsequent offenses likely to result in more severe disciplinary action. In addition, if a cell phone is used in the breaking of another school rule (e.g. cheating), the consequences for the cell phone offense itself may be more severe that the current offense warrants.

Help us control cell phones while at school. Students are allowed to use their cell phones in a responsible way at lunch time from 12:00 p.m. to 12:35 p.m. If you are going to call or text your child, please do it during this time so your child won't receive a consequence or disrupt the learning of others.

I hope all of our students have a successful and rewarding school year. From time to time, you may have a question for your child's teacher. We encourage you to use the following procedure as a framework to address such concerns: first contact your child's teacher via phone or email; second, schedule a conference with your child's teacher if you feel the matter is better handled in person than via phone or email; finally, contact me or our school counselor for other concerns. Following these procedures, or the chain of command, if you will, tends to promote positive relationships between parents. faculty and students. And we certainly appreciate your efforts to use these common procedures.

Oklahoma's Promise (OHLAP)

You may be able to attend college for free! Are you an Oklahoma resident? Are you enrolled in the eighth, ninth or 10th grade in an Oklahoma high school? Do your parents make no more than \$50,000 per year? If you answered yes to all of these questions, then you are eligible for OHLAP, a program set up by Oklahoma legislature to help students pay for college. In order to prepare for college and fulfill the program's requirements, you must take certain high school courses, pass those courses and pass your EOI's.

If you promise to prepare for college in and out of the classroom, Oklahoma promises to help pay for your college tuition!

Applications must be completed in the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade.

We have a few announcements for parents regarding our academic programs this year. First, I am pleased to report that Cashion Elementary School has met the No Child Left Behind requirements for "adequate yearly progress" (AYP). This federal mandate has increasingly stringent guidelines for academic proficiency, and Cashion Elementary has once again met those guidelines. Additionally, our state Academic Performance Index (API) score is up 29 points from last year. This is further evidence of the high quality of teachers and students we have in the Cashion School District. Way to go, Wildcats!

In an effort to maintain excellence, I am pleased to report that we have expanded our academic interventions for 2011-2012. We will now be providing Title I reading and math remediation for students in all grades at Cashion Elementary. Formerly, our interventions targeted grade 1 through 6. This year, we'll provide extra support for preschool and kindergarten students as well, in order to build a strong foundation for academic success in the coming years.

Finally, I would like to remind parents about before school and after school car traffic. We would appreciate your cooperation with drop-offs and pick-ups.
