With the staunch support of the Cashion Board of Education, the administrative team hopes to supply more interactive boards in the future if teachers desire them. In addition, training will be available to the teachers in the appropriate use of this technology.

Without superior teaching, the utilization of technology in the classroom will not blossom to its greatest potential. Technology is a remarkable vehicle for combining teaching and learning. I anticipate that we'll see our faculty increase the depth of knowledge they possess as they expose students to richer lessons across the curriculum. As we continue to define what a 21st century education means to our students, the principles of problem-solving, communication, and collaboration will be at the heart of the instruction our students receive.

In the high school, we have a few things that are happening and I wanted to inform you of those things. We have purchased a new mobile mini lab. Our teachers and students will be able to use this lab in the new high school for projects, typing, and online instructional lessons. I am very excited for this technology to be incorporated into our high school curriculum. I think this gives our students some hands on training and will keep them engaged in our classrooms.

Other exciting news includes purchasing Smart Boards and having them installed in five of our high school teachers' rooms. The SMART Board[™] interactive whiteboard has a large, interactive screen on which teachers and students can explore a website, give a science presentation, or take a virtual field trip. It helps teachers improve student motivation and performance by making inquiry-based learning a dynamic classroom experience. The key to this experience is touch. You simply touch the surface to select menus and icons. To write notes, pick up a pen, and write with either the pen or your finger. The SMART Board interactive whiteboard meets the needs of both visual and kinesthetic learners. Students see large, vibrant images and physically interact with material by moving letters, numbers, words and pictures with their fingers.

FREE COLLEGE TUITION

Oklahoma Promise (formerly OHLAP) <u>ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS</u>

To be eligible to enroll in Oklahoma's Promise, a student must meet the following requirements:

- The student must be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.
- The student must be enrolled in the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade. [Home school students must be age 13, 14, or 15.]
- Student must be enrolled by June 30th of the 10th grade.
- The income of the student's parent(s) from taxed and untaxed sources for the most recently completed federal tax year must not exceed \$50,000.
- Meet additional qualifications as stated in the Oklahoma Promise application.

**CLASS OF 2010----ADMISSION AND SCHOLARSHIP DEADLINES:

Apply early for admission and scholarships. Apply to all schools and have all scholarship and admission applications in to your chosen school by *February* 1st for priority consideration.

<u>All</u> seniors who plan on attending college or vocational school should fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon after January 1st as possible. Even if you don't think you will qualify for Financial Aid everyone should fill it out. Some universities require that you fill it out before you can be awarded jobs on campus, etc.

Hoggatt's Happenings

I have had many parents ask me, "How can I help teach my child to love math?" First, be sure to talk up math. Let them know that you think math is fun and that they will use it their whole life. Then, make math a part of daily life. At the post office, have your child estimate how many people are in line. In the grocery store, ask them how much milk will cost with a 50-cent-off coupon. Be sure to mention the math skills they used ("That was excellent subtraction!"). Put math into fun time, too. Play games like Yahtzee, Connect Four, or Monopoly. At bedtime, read books about math. Try *Equal Shmequal* by Virginia Kroll to learn what equal means, or *Counting on Frank*, Rod Clement's tale of a boy who uses his dog Frank as a ruler.

Also, Ask your child...How long is a second? A minute? An hour? Here are some ways to help your child understand time:

- 1. Ask them how many times they can clap their hands in a second or how many summersaults they can do in a minute. Then, time them. They'll get a better idea of how long a second or minute really is. Have them think of other things he can do in a second (give you a hug) or a minute (sing a song).
- Teach your child about "elapsed time" by making a schedule. On poster board, list times (8:00, 8:30, 9:00), and help them write in scheduled events (breakfast, soccer practice). Use the poster to ask questions. Example: "You get home at 5:00, and dinner is at 6:00. How much time do you have to play?

In closing, I would like to remind you of a few things.

- 1. Please remember that if your child is a car rider they need to be dropped off and picked up on the west side of the school and that students need to be here at 8:15 a.m., not any earlier please. Our buses are loading on the east side.
