# **Hoggatt's Happenings**

Last month I wrote about *Reading Fluency*. To sum up my five month reading instruction series I am closing with **Reading Comprehension**. Teachers call the ability to understand what you read "comprehension."

We read for a reason. To get swept away by a great story. Or find out what happened in last night's game. Or figure out how to put together a bicycle. (Good Luck!) There is no point to reading it if doesn't help us understand something.

That is why we spend so much time helping kids learn how to read. Eventually, they will read for a purpose. If your daughter can read the words on a page, but doesn't understand what the words mean, she's really not reading. Reading uses a reader's own knowledge of the world, and of the words, to make sense of what she reads. Research over 30 years has found ways parents can help their children become better at understanding, remembering, and communicating what they read.

Does your child understand the details, the meaning and the ideas behind what she is reading? **How can you help?** Ask questions! It's a great way to know if your young reader really understands what he reads. And it stimulates his brain to think and ask questions himself. When you're reading a story with your child, stop and ask questions once in a while: Why did that character do that? What do you think will happen next? What would you do in that situation? Don't just ask questions about books-do it about everything you see with your child-from what's for dinner to what the coach should do in the next play. **By asking these questions you will build your student's reading comprehension skills!**
